

Donald B. Rubin is the John L. Loeb Professor of Statistics at Harvard University since 2002. He was hired by Harvard in 1984, and served as chair of department from 1985-1994 and 2000-2004. He is mostly known for dealing with missing data and imputation, and Rubin Causal Model, a set of methods designed for causal inference with observational data.



In 1987 he published the highly estimated books “Multiple Imputation for Nonresponse in Surveys” and “Statistical Analysis with Missing Data” (with R.J. Little) on John Wiley and Sons.

He is one of the most well-known statisticians with over 350 publications on a variety of topics, including survey methods, matched sampling and Bayesian methods. He is also the recipient of four of the most prestigious awards available for statisticians: the Samuel S. Wilks Medal of the American Statistical Association, the Parzen Prize for Statistical Innovation, the Fisher Lectureship, and George W. Snedecor Award of the Committee of Presidents of Statistical Societies.

Professor Rubin has lectured extensively throughout The Americas, Europe and Asia. For many years, he has been one of the mostly cited writers in mathematics in the world, according to ISI Science Watch.
